Supporting what you love, long after you've gone

For Claude Hewlett, supporting what you love long after you've gone, meant providing a substantial annual funding stream to the horses he loved, and the people who need them, well into the future.

Claude left school at 13 to go farming before being drafted into the army to fight in World War II. He was a gunner in Italy before serving as a peacekeeper on the Yugoslav border. He returned to farming after the war and reconnected with Marjory, whom he had met when they both worked on a Pongakawa farm.

Claude and Marjory married in 1946 and Claude continued farming until 1954, when they moved to Tauranga. Claude began work as a builder, and Marjory worked as a supervisor at the nurses' home at Tauranga Hospital.

It was Marjory who first introduced Claude to horses, and it's hard to imagine his life without them. He spent 43 years involved with the Greerton Pony Club and was president of the Papamoa Pony Club for five years. Claude also organised equestrian sports at the Tauranga A & P Show for 19 years. As a founding member and then President of the Tauranga District Riding for the Disabled for 25 years, it is only fitting that Claude and Marjory's endowment fund is directed towards supporting this organisation in the WBOP. individuals in the WBOP on behalf of our generous donors. Giving Circles support BOP charities

Thank you to the three Acorn Giving Circles who recently gifted significant donations to various charities in our region. The Giving Circles include Sally's Angels, First XI and the Honeybadgers. Each of these Giving Circles is made up of at least ten local people, who are united in their desire to make a difference together. The group members donate \$50 each month, pool their donations, and then get together once or twice a year to decide where to gift the money. Reflecting the current need in our community around food security, all three of the Giving Circles chose to gift some of their donation to Tauranga Community Foodbank. Nicki Goodwin, Manager at Tauranga Community Foodbank, said, "these donations will assist us with buying food to provide nutritious food support for people who would otherwise have nowhere else to turn. Unfortunately, we have seen a growth in demand for our service as the cost of living is affecting many people who would normally not need our support."

Other charities chosen by the Giving Circles include local food security charities Good Neighbour and Street Kai, and youth charities Te Aranui Youth Trust and Bay of Plenty Youth Development Trust.

By pooling their donations across the year, each of the Giving Circles were able



to donate a significant amount – between \$5,000 and \$7,000 per Giving Circle. This amount was then split between their chosen charity recipients.

Often, some of the group members will have an idea of where they would like to donate the money but the Acorn team are always on hand to provide guidance. Bridget Cummins, member of the First XI Giving Circle, explained to us why she enjoys being part of an Acorn Giving Circle.

"Being part of a Giving Circle makes you aware of what is going on in the community. Acorn has their finger on the pulse and works with lots of different charities in areas that may be 'under the radar' of many people. It is that part of the community that need some help."

A gift in a will means that Canteen Aotearoa will receive annual funding to support rangatahi/young people impacted by cancer

Around 4,200 rangatahi (youth) are impacted by cancer each year in Aotearoa, whether it's their own diagnosis or cancer in their whānau. Canteen's mission is to ensure they don't have to face cancer alone.

Canteen provides vital support services tailored to the individual's specific needs and cancer experience. Their Clinical Team offers a wide range of free services to support rangatahi, including individual support, peer events, therapeutic camps and programmes, and specialised online support through Canteen Connect.

Annual funding from the Roy and Mary McGowan Fund and Emergency Services Club Fund helps Canteen support its members living in the Western Bay of Plenty (WBOP).

Chief Executive of Canteen, Nick Laing, expressed what that funding means

to them, "The financial support we receive from the Roy and Mary McGowan Fund helps Canteen Aotearoa continue to provide its vital support services for rangatahi impacted by cancer. This includes individual counselling and opportunities for rangatahi to connect with others who understand what they're going through. One of the most important programmes that this fund directly supports is CanSurf, an annual camp held at Waihi Beach. It's a weekend where rangatahi learn to surf amongst other activities, which gives them a safe space to have some fun, get a break from cancer and connect with other rangatahi, creating bonds that continue long after the weekend ends."

Over the years, more than 350 local individuals, couples, and families have decided that leaving a gift in their will to support the WBOP community is a great



option. Gifts given through the Acorn Foundation are invested in perpetuity, generating investment returns that are distributed annually to community organisations working in areas that are closest to our donors' hearts.

Roy and Mary were able to support many deserving organisations through their gift in their will to Acorn. Canteen was thrilled to be chosen by Mary to receive annual distributions from their fund.

"Canteen provided amazing support for both my siblings and I, and I cannot describe what it was like to be part of a group that completely understood my experience and were so open and honest with each other. Cancer is such an awkward topic, and it's so freeing to be able to talk about your experience without feeling like you're making other people uncomfortable," said Tauranga Canteen sibling member, Lola.

Lola also joined Canteen's Leadership Programme to support other rangatahi dealing with cancer in their whānau. The programme has given her the opportunity to develop key skills, learn more about her leadership style, and support her peers.

The impact that Mary and Roy have had on our region will live on through the gift they left to the community they loved so much, through their Acorn fund.

Jann Medlicott's legacy will live on through her annual Acorn Prize for Fiction. The 2023 winner received \$64,000.

The prestigious Jann Medlicott Acorn Prize for Fiction winner was announced in May at the 2023 Ockham New Zealand Book Awards. The awards were attended by Acorn's Chair Lesley Jensen and Trustees Brian Cloughley and Michael Attwood. Acorn staff



member Margot McCool was given the pleasure of awarding the Acorn to Catherine Chidgey, a two-time winner.

The award has been offered since 2016 thanks to the late Acorn supporter Jann Medlicott, and it was awarded this year for Catherine's novel *The Axeman's Carnival*.

The Fiction category's convenor of judges, Stephanie Johnson, says *The Axeman's Carnival* is a novel that has been clasped to New Zealanders' hearts.

"The unforgettable Tama (magpie) – taken in and raised by Marnie on the Te Waipounamu high country farm she shares with champion axeman husband Rob – constantly entertains with his take on the foibles and dramas of his human companions. Catherine Chidgey's writing is masterful, and the underlying sense of dread as the story unfolds is shot through with humour and humanity."

"The Axeman's Carnival is unique: poetic, profound and a powerfully compelling read from start to finish."

This is Catherine's second win at the Ockham New Zealand Book Awards. She won the Acorn Foundation Fiction Prize in 2017 for The Wish Child. Both books are published by Te Herenga Waka University Press.

Donors we remember

Graham O'Neill [1943 - 2023]

Graham was born in Rotorua, the youngest of six children. His family had operated a dairy farm in Katikati since the 1940s. He developed a keen interest in regenerative farming and soil health, which he applied to his property with considerable success.

Graham was heavily involved in the Scout movement, having been in the Boy Scouts, Sea Scouts, and Venturers,

and receiving the Queen's Scout Award. An active Scout leader, Graham enjoyed sharing his skills and wisdom with younger boys in the Katikati community.

Graham developed a love of sailing and sailed his keeler yacht regularly to the Bay of Islands and beyond. He also enjoyed travelling and went on five world tours during his lifetime.

His Acorn fund will support a wide range of organisations in the Katikati community, including providing several tertiary scholarships at Katikati College.

Yvonne Harrison [1929 - 2023]

Yvonne was born in Waitara in 1929 and began her married life with her husband Doug Harrison in 1955 on a dairy farm in the Minden area. Doug and Yvonne raised six children together alongside developing the kiwifruit orchard on the farm.

Doug and Yvonne were always involved in the community in some way – it was always very close to their heart. Both belonged to a group called the New Hebrides Association where they assisted with building and development work in the New Hebrides (now Vanuatu).

Yvonne was involved with Enliven Carruth day programme to support older people and knitted countless booties, hats, and cardigans for Plunket. The couple loved to travel together and had many interesting and exotic holidays in various parts of the world to see how other people live.

The Harrisons wanted their commitment to the community to continue long into the future, so they set up their Acorn fund to allow for annual distribution to Plunket and St. John.

Introducing a new role for Acorn

Emily Goulding, who has been working for Acorn as our marketing specialist since 2021, has recently started a new role focusing on Corporate and Community Giving. In this role, Emily will focus on promoting 'other ways to give' via Acorn, as opposed to our traditional endowment fund giving model. This includes Corporate and Workplace Giving, giving as part of a Giving Circle, and supporting charities who have set up their own Community Group Fund with Acorn. Emily will also support those of our donors who do 'pass-through giving' (a donation that we immediately pass through to charities, rather than via an endowment fund).

"There's lots of potential for Acorn to engage with people in our wider community, who may not be in a position yet to create an endowment fund. To-date, Acorn hasn't had the resources to focus on these other ways to give, so it's an exciting time to be starting this new role," says Emily.
