Acorn's financial self-sufficiency means more money for local charities

We are immensely proud to announce that the Acorn Foundation has reached financial self-sufficiency in our FY2021 budget. This achievement - thanks to the generosity of people all across our region – means that money that was needed to fund Acorn expenses over the years can now help other local charities!

The foundation is fortunate that several donors have allocated a portion of the annual distributions from their fund to support Acorn's operating costs, which combined with the 1% fee taken

annually from its fund--now exceeding \$36M—will cover Acorn's expenses going forward. Reaching this goal means that the foundation will no longer require corporate, trust or direct donor gifts to help cover its operational costs, freeing that money up to assist other worthy organisations in the region.

Over the years, many local businesses and trusts supported Acorn's work, including BayTrust, Legacy Trust, Craigs Investment Partners, BNZ Partners, and Tabak Business Sales. In addition, dozens of Acorn volunteers, donors and supporters have gifted money to help with administrative expenses since its founding.

On a national basis, The Tindall Foundation has provided more than \$1.3M in donations to charities in the Western and Eastern Bay of Plenty between 2003 and June 2020, including nearly \$150,000 in service fees for Acorn to act as its Local Donation Manager. Going forward, the Acorn Foundation will be able to pass through all TTF donations to the community, providing even more support to local charitable organisations.

VITAL UPDATES

Living Without Violence

Tauranga Living Without Violence (TLWV) are specialist providers of services within the domestic violence arena, including services to victims, perpetrators, and children who experience domestic violence. Their vision is "Safe homes, safe communities and for all people in Tauranga Moana to live free from all forms of violence, abuse and oppression." The services offered include safety programmes, non-violence programmes, children's programmes, counselling and whanau support. All client engagement commences with a risk assessment, typically followed by safety planning and where necessary, advocacy and individual support sessions.

TLWV works collaboratively with many other local services, including Tauranga Women's Refuge, Shakti Ethnic Women's Refuge and Tautoko Mai Sexual Harm Support. The current team consists of 10 staff as well as 9 contractors, who facilitate programme delivery and provide childcare on-site, enabling parents to attend weekly programme sessions. The agency was deemed an essential service by the Ministry of Social Development (MSD), for the purpose of COVID-19 response. Although they had only recently completed an IT upgrade, they were lacking in webcams and speakers for each computer, to allow staff to work remotely. A grant was received from the COVID-19



WBOP Recovery Fund (established by Acorn, TECT, BayTrust and Tauranga City Council), which assisted with the purchase of webcams and speakers, enabling remote service delivery.

Their team were aware of an escalation of violence amongst some existing clients during the period of lockdown. As a result, TLWV has established a position for a whānau worker, who commenced in this role on 3 August. This role will provide social work support to whanau affected by domestic violence, and support victims.

Family Harm is a very significant problem in Tauranga Moana. The Vital Update® report just released shows that 4% of our population report being affected by family harm, with another 4% preferring not to say. Domestic violence (63%) remains the most common form, followed by child abuse (32%) sexual assault (26%) and intimate partner harm (23%). This could be reflective of up to 10,000 people across Tauranga City.

A grant of \$8,000 was recently given to Tauranga Living Without Violence, from the Tauranga Help fund.

WBOP Rapid Response Fund

PHASE 1: RAPID RESPONSE

In April 2020, following the rapid closure of our borders, funders in the Western Bay of Plenty came together to establish a Rapid Response Fund to support those community groups who were experiencing increased demand and/or funding shortfall as a result of COVID-19. It was an insight into just how quickly disaster and/or relief funds can be implemented! The funders (TECT, BayTrust, Acorn Foundation and Tauranga City Council) collectively pooled funds totalling \$600,000 to create the WBOP Rapid Response Fund. Groups who were providing essential services as defined by the government were invited to make the first applications to the Fund, and the turnaround from application received, to money in the bank was less than five days. 34 groups were supported with \$232,000 in funding during this Rapid Response phase.

PHASE TWO: RECOVERY PHASE

In late June, this Fund transitioned into phase two of funding support, with an aim to help key Western Bay of Plenty community groups survive the medium-term impact of the pandemic, enabling the longer-term rebuild of the community sector. The fund, which was valued at \$777,000 at inception, will ensure the continuity of support services people rely on in our region. Examples of organisations the fund is supporting include groups providing



immediate or essential services such as food banks, refuges, and emergency housing, as well as organisations that work to prevent an escalated need for emergency support such as budgeting, alcohol and drug services, family violence prevention, and housing advocacy. Those organisations responding to economic and social issues will also be supported, including community-led engagement programmes, inclusive opportunities, cultural opportunities, and youth engagement programmes. Tauranga City Council Mayor Tenby Powell says many community groups in the region have faced an increased demand for services, an inability to fundraise, and the need to adapt service delivery to operate safely. "All of these impacts have forced community groups to think outside the box. We are seeing incredible examples of collaboration, adaptation of service, and innovative approaches to address the challenges arising from Covid-19. But these come at a cost and we are keen to help our community providers deliver great outcomes by providing joint financial assistance with other local funders. That support will lead to our region coming out stronger on the other side of this crisis." A three-phase approach for the fund is planned by the funders with the third phase to support the longer-term resilience and reinvention of the sector.

Vital Update Research Released

Acorn continues to work closely with other local funding agencies to ensure that our funds collectively make the greatest difference in areas of high need. We have recently completed an extensive piece of research with over 5,200 respondents, together with Tauranga City Council, TECT and BayTrust, called Vital Update. This research will help us all to plan for a better future for the residents in the Tauranga region.

Here are a few of the most important findings:

- The climate and our beautiful surroundings are the main reasons why people love to live here.
- The single most important priority for improvement is less traffic congestion and better roading infrastructure.
- Roughly 3% of our population is experiencing some level of homelessness – representing around 4,000 people who do not have secure, safe housing.
- 20% of people have no savings at all, while 44% of households in Tauranga have savings that will only last for up to one month.
 Savings statistics are even worse for Maori and those with disabilities.
- 96% of residents have access to the internet, and 93% have access to a computer.
- Despite this high level of digital connectivity, 20% of 16–24 year-olds feel alone "most or all of the time."
- 21% of the Pacifica community are likely to have experienced family harm, compared with up to 8% for the overall population.

People with disabilities are dramatically over-represented in negative statistics, such as feeling alone most or all of the time (44% v. 11% for overall population); suffering family harm (10% v. 4%); having no savings (43% v. 20%); and young people aged 16-24 with disabilities are more likely to take drugs (13% v. 8%).



There is a huge amount of fascinating data in the full report, and this work also includes 12 suburb snapshots. In addition, more detailed reports are available for some key groups whose voices are often not heard or represented well in research, including:

- Youth
- Maori
- Ageing population
- Disabled people (including carers)
- Ethnic communities and newcomers to the city
- · People experiencing homelessness

Carol was extremely social and had many friends. She was a hard worker who worked as a shuttle driver until she became ill. She loved cycle touring and travelled extensively throughout her life, and in recent years she had travelled to Turkey, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, America and the Galapagos Islands.

Carol always discussed leaving a financial legacy to charity and found she could do so in perpetuity through the Acorn Foundation.

The Carol Bithell Fund will provide support to a variety of organisations, including SPCA Tauranga, Philips Search and Rescue Trust, Mount Maunganui Lifeguard Service, Papamoa Surf Lifesaving, Cancer Society Tauranga, Starship Hospital, and Supporters of Tiritiri Matangi Incorporated.

Sam (1938 - 2019) and Nulma (1933 -2014) Turner

In 1946, siblings Sam and Nulma Turner moved as young children with their parents from the West Coast to Mount Maunganui. Nulma became a very competent legal assistant where she worked for John F Trapski at the Mount. Sam was an accountant and worked for accounting firm Garligier, Waterhouse and Simmonds. He later moved to accountants Eagles, Sherman & Lloyd and also worked for the Tauranga Borough Council from 1956-68. Sam and Nulma both loved to travel and have been as far as Antarctica. They were also very keen gardeners.

Malcolm (1933-2015) and Joan (1934 -2019) Jackson

Both Malcolm and Joan Jackson came from farming

Jackson came from farming families and continued on this tradition of owning farms in Gisborne, Otamauri, Wellsford and Kaiwaka before moving north to set up an Avocado and Tamarillo Orchard in Whangarei. Malcolm and Joan had four children. Both Malcolm and Joan were very much involved in their local communities. Joan became a qualified Pony Club Instructor and a very competitive golfer, and Malcolm was a member of Rotary in Wellsford and Whangarei and was President of the Waiwhere Sports Committee, as well as being a very keen fisherman. Sadly, Malcolm suffered a stroke at the age of 60 which created a lifestyle change, and Malcolm and Joan subsequently moved to Omokoroa in Tauranga.

Malcolm and Joan's funds have contributed to the Acorn Vital Impact Fund.

Norman (1920 -2019) & Molly (1924 - 2014) Bicknell

They met in Wellington in their early twenties (Norman was from Khandallah and Molly was from Glasgow, Scotland). They fell in love and were married for 58 years.

Soon after they moved to Tauranga, they bought their first home in Greerton, followed by their forever home in Otumoetai. Having no children, Molly worked as a clerk for the Power Board and received a silver platter commemorating 25 years' service. Norman worked for the BOP Yorkshire General Insurance Co and later General Accident Insurance. Norman was an active member of Masonic Lodge and, after retiring, he was treasurer at the CT Club. Norman and Molly were both keen gardeners and loved the city of Tauranga. Molly passed away in 2014 at the age of 90 and Norman passed away in 2019 at the age of 99. Their fund will support one full scholarship to Outward Bound with the balance remaining unrestricted.



Trust Resettlements

Many people might not realise that over the past decade the Law Commission has led a review of trust law in order to modernise the law and make it more accessible. This review ultimately resulted in the enactment of the Trusts Act 2019 (the Act), which takes effect on 31 January 2021. Overall, the Act increases the compliance requirements imposed on trustees, improves beneficiary rights to access information and increases the scope for beneficiary claims against trustees and professional advisors. Due to these upcoming changes, many people are re-evaluating the need to maintain family and community trusts, and transfers to Community Foundations like Acorn are occurring all over the country.

Acorn Foundation partners with Owens Charitable Trust

The Acorn Foundation is thrilled to partner with the Owens Charitable Trust to take over the important local programme that has provided tertiary scholarships in the region for over 25 years. Joy and Bob Owens founded the Owens Charitable Trust in 1990 and began delivering scholarships at Tauranga Boys' College and Tauranga Girls' College in 1993. Mount College, Otumoetai College, Te Puke High School, Bethlehem College and Aquinas College were all added by 2007, with the programme now delivering \$15,000 scholarships over three years to worthy students from each of the seven schools.

OCT Trustee Robin Owens says, "As Trustees, Mahe Drysdale, Bill Capamagian and I very much wanted to ensure that the Bob and Joy Owens Scholarships continued on into the future providing such wonderful support for young people in the community. By placing the administration of these scholarships into the professional hands of the Acorn Foundation, we are ensuring that the Scholarships will continue on exactly as they have always done for many years to come."

The awards will now be known as the Bob & Joy Owens Scholarships and will continue to be awarded at each school's Year 13 end of year Prizegiving.


Goodwill Trust moves to Acorn
